Purpose:

The Transitional Age Program (TAP) is a court-supervised comprehensive inpatient and outpatient substance abuse treatment program for transitional age individuals dependent on alcohol or drugs. This program addresses clients' substance abuse and other issues in order to reduce recidivism in the criminal justice system.

Treatment Includes:

- Regular random drug testing (urine tests),
- Intensive individual and group substance abuse and mental health counseling, inpatient treatment, if clinically appropriate;
- Vocational education and guidance,
- Community supervision and collaborate case management,
- Referrals to sober living, low income housing, and/or temporary/transitional housing,
- Electronic monitoring,¹ and
- Regular court status check reviews.

Eligibility:

- Males and Females
- 18 to 25.5 years of age at time of application,
- Minimum of 18 months remaining on Probation,
- Identified alcohol/substance abuse disorder, and
- No sex offenders,
- No history of drug trafficking/sales,
- No history of violent offenses or arson, however, each case will be staffed on a case by case basis.

Cost: Each participant is required to pay a Court Fee of \$1,500.00. The program costs for treatment and testing are paid by the Court. Ancillary services or sanctions may require additional fees to be paid by participant.

Length: The program length is a minimum of 18 months (78 treatment weeks), subject to participation and compliance.
